LUCA GHIRETTI'S YEAR IN CAMBRIDGE



Luca, who already has an MA in Law and, instead of starting a lucrative career as a successful lawyer, decided to become a minister, passed with Merit his finals for the MA in Pastoral Theology with the Cambridge Theological Federation.

Of course, one year in Cambridge cannot be summarised in a few lines, but what was good to hear – when we last met just before he left, at Michaelhouse, a delightful church-cum-cafè in the very heart of the city – was that he was taking back, not just more theoretical knowledge, but also a great deal of experience beneficial to his future work as a minister in Italy. He has enjoyed every minute and every aspect of his

time at Wesley House and he is deeply grateful to our Committee and those of you who contributed to making his stay possible. He loved the course and the tutors and was delighted to be able to share study, worship and discussions in the theological seminars with fellow candidates for the ministry from different Christian denominations. So much which in Britain we take for granted, such as being able to preach and worship in different churches of so many different traditions and denominations, was for him a great adventure, and he is taking home memories and friendships to treasure for life.

He thinks that the profound theoretical study which is so important in the Waldensian Seminary is essential, but he found vital also the more practical aspects he has researched – alongside the Liturgy and the Sacraments – and how these aspects of worship are perceived by different branches of Protestantism. Studying the English Reformation and its ramifications has shed a new light on this country, which one really cannot understand nowadays without knowing its history.

Alongside his main studies at the Faculty of Divinity and the Cambridge Theological Federation, comprising Christian culture, Mission, Christian Spirituality, Gospel and Western culture, Schism, Conflict and Unity in the Church, Luca followed various seminars on Science and Religion at the Faraday Institute, took part in various lectures at the Henry Martyn Centre and listened to a public debate on Religion and Atheism with Rowan Williams. He also did the preparation for a Social Placement in a prison. Unfortunately, that was rendered impossible owing to the new nationality requirements for Prison Service Chaplains. Instead, he had a placement with Emmanuel URC, focusing on new ways of being **??something missing here??** church. Lastly, but not least, he now feels much more rooted into the Methodist tradition, having researched its history and various ramifications.
